

THE MISSION

The unsearchably great God of the Scriptures is worthy of all glory, honor, praise, and blessing (Rom. 11:36; Ps. 145:3; Rev. 4:11). He is so determined to receive his due praise that, in love, he eagerly gave up his Son, Jesus, to purchase for himself individuals from every tribe and tongue and people and nation (Isa. 53:10; Jn. 3:16; 1Cor. 6:18; Rev. 5:9). From the time that Christ ascended until he rescues his people from his coming wrath (1Thess. 5:9-10), the church remains the sole sanctioned, equipped, authorized, and empowered vehicle for bringing the gospel to mankind for the glory of God. Therefore, we have purposed with the Lord’s help to establish a church in New Orleans, Louisiana in November 2023.

With God’s glory as our preeminent pursuit, we intend to follow Jesus’ clear instructions (Mt. 28:18-20) and the early church’s subsequent example (Acts 2:14-47) by discipling New Orleanians, baptizing them and teaching them to obey everything that Jesus commanded. At its most basic level, this discipleship requires teaching and modeling godliness (Jn. 13:1-17; 1Thess. 2:1-12). This simple pattern is comprehensive in its scope and over time, by God’s grace, will transform every aspect of the lives of those who are drawn into the church.

THE JOURNEY

The origin of every local church is rooted in the ministry of another local church (or multiple local churches). Grace Bible Church NOLA is no different. [Grace Bible Church](#) (Tempe, AZ) was committed to equipping the saints for the work of ministry before the need for sound churches in New Orleans was ever being considered by its pastors. As Grace Bible Church (Tempe) was growing in its ability to equip and disciple, God was also working on a smaller scale on the other side of the country.

God saved Omri Miles in February 2008 while he was attending college in Augusta, GA. Along with this new spiritual life came a great burden to bring the gospel to New Orleans, LA, where he was born and raised. However, after graduating a few months later, he would drive 1,500 miles past New Orleans to join GBC (Tempe) and learn how to live the Christian life. Over the past 14.5 years, Omri has been preparing and laboring to see a biblically sound church planted in New Orleans East.

In May 2021, the elders were ready to make their intentions for church planting in New Orleans formally known to the church body. After a few informational meetings, several families started gathering monthly as a core team to begin praying together, learning about New Orleans, and preparing for this endeavor.

The core team visited New Orleans on scouting trips in December 2021 and then again in July 2022. These trips served as the introduction to the city for many core team members, further knitting their lives to one another and helping them to discern whether God was calling them to this work. Currently, several households plan to relocate to New Orleans to begin laboring in gospel ministry there.



THE PLACE

“New Orleans was built in a place God never intended a city to be built...six feet below sea level in the middle of a swamp, squeezed between a giant river and a huge lake.”² The French called it Le Flattant (The Floating Land) and the English named it The Wet Grave.³ “It was also a city plagued by epidemics...a haven for political refugees, as well as...the sanctuary of criminals and, above all, the dream of fortune seekers.”⁴ Historically, New Orleans vacillated between Spanish and French control, was a settlement funded by “perhaps the most monumentally fraudulent real estate scheme in history,”⁵ initially increased its population through forced immigration with inmates from Paris prisons, and became characterized in its infancy by “frequent and almost inevitable robberies which were perpetuated...by a multitude of vagabonds of every nation.”⁶

Despite these deprecations, New Orleans (pronounced “Or-linz”) is considered by some “the Nation’s most interesting city.”⁷ It is renowned for its unique cuisine, the birthplace of Jazz music, and one of the top ten most visited cities in the United States. From its inception, New Orleans has been a hodgepodge of nations, ethnicities, and languages, resulting in a culture all its own. Nevertheless, it has yet been unable to outlive its initial reputation for violence and immorality, since, to date, it is regularly among the country’s most dangerous cities⁸ and infamous for its celebration of the rankest debauchery⁹. The need for sound, gospel-preaching churches in New Orleans is undeniable and urgent.

NEW ORLEANS EAST

The entire city contains about 384,000 residents within 169 mi². New Orleans East, a section of the city lying just southeast of Lake Pontchartrain, is the youngest section of the city and home to approximately 85,000 souls, a slow but steady increase since it was devastated in 2005 by Hurricane Katrina. It was affected more than most areas of the city and has been the slowest to recover.

The East never attained the prominence that some sought for it in the 70s. Today, abandoned properties, unkempt lots, and a scarcity of long-standing businesses are the unfortunate scars that still mark New Orleans East after Hurricane Katrina. To these economic sores can be added even greater maladies: the rarity of two-parent homes, high rates of violent crimes, low education levels, pervasive poverty, a languishing police department, and an indolent population. The prominence of these problems is felt by all, but are perpetually misdiagnosed and mistreated. New Orleanians are sin-sick and unaware that Christ is the solution. In Him “are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge” (Col. 2:3), which is why the East needs a church that is

teaching the truth clearly and discipling those with an ear to hear.

There are a few churches outside of New Orleans East that seem somewhat like-minded.¹⁰ These churches, however, are not ministering to residents in this area and gather in places not conducive to fellowship for the East's population.

RELIGIOUS CLIMATE

Roman Catholicism has always dominated New Orleans' religious makeup. Today, many Protestant churches are heavily influenced by charismatic doctrines as well as health and wealth/prosperity gospel teaching. The Southern Baptist Convention possesses the largest number of congregations of any denomination in the city and has one of its flagship schools, [New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary](#), located in Gentilly, an area bordering New Orleans East. But as is common in the Bible Belt, many citizens claim to know God but by their deeds deny him (Ti. 1:16). We believe these factors build an even stronger case that the city needs more churches possessing our particular distinctives.

THE DISTINCTIVES

QUALIFIED LEADERSHIP. Those who lead God's church must be marked by exemplary godliness so that the church's message is irreproachable and so that its members are conformed to Christ's image as they imitate the faith of their leaders. *Therefore, we will appoint leaders who are marked by imitable godliness, wisdom, and humility, never bypassing these qualities in favor of a man's skill, charisma, or gifting.*

EXPOSITORY PREACHING. Expository preaching is the authoritative proclamation of God's Word in which the preacher clearly sets forth the divinely intended meaning of the biblical text and brings the contemporary implications of its timeless truth to bear on the lives of the people.¹¹ *Therefore, all that we do as a church must reflect our dependence on and prioritization of the preaching and teaching of God's word.*

FRUITFUL FAITH. Everyone whom God graciously saves through faith will embrace Jesus as Lord, ever striving to make their thoughts, desires, motives, words, and deeds submit to God's will so that they bear fruit in keeping with repentance. *Therefore, we will seek to graciously stimulate and humbly evaluate one another's faith, knowing that our obedient (albeit imperfect) good works are the evidence of saving faith and God's grace at work in us.*

MASCULINE TRAINING. Continually raising up men to Christian maturity is essential to the church's proper working and enduring faithfulness because God has ordained that men would lead the church as well as the family, which is the basic building block of any society. *Therefore, we will make training the men of the church our discipleship priority, yet without neglecting the discipleship needs of the women and children among us.*

MEANINGFUL MEMBERSHIP. Church membership confirms a believer's attachment to a local assembly so that each member formally affirms the church's teaching and formally commits to participating in the church's ministry, living obediently with the other members, and submitting to the church's leadership. *Therefore, we will maintain clear standards for membership and prioritize our ministry to one another.*

BIBLICAL COUNSELING. The Scriptures are sufficient to equip God's people to live a life pleasing to Him without the help of psychological theories, scientific discoveries, or manmade ideologies. *Therefore, we will consult the Scriptures alone to understand what constitutes good human behavior, proper mental life, and healthy personhood.*

FAMILIAL DISCIPLINE. One primary way that God disciplines His children is through their loving pursuit and gentle correction of one another for their restoration or until unrepentant hardness of heart is revealed. *Therefore, we will strive to gently, patiently, and lovingly admonish, encourage, help, and instruct one another so that together we might share in God's holiness, represent Him accurately in the world, and faithfully uphold His truth.*

TESTIMONY


THE NEED

PRAYER

PENNIES

God is glorified when his people contribute generously to support the advancement of his gospel (2Cor. 9:12-13). Being fully convinced that God will receive glory through his church in New Orleans East and that, as our Lord said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35), we do not seek the gift itself, but our greatest desire is the benefit and blessing of those who partner with us in this work (Phil. 4:17).

By operating at minimal costs, we hope to be able to function at a fraction of the budget of well-established churches during the early years of ministry. Recognizing that (1) the preaching and teaching of God's word and Sunday's corporate gatherings are central in the life of the church, (2) New Orleans East is a low-income area and our target population has less means for supporting ministry, and (3) it takes time to teach a church to give generously, our goal is to raise support for the first several years. Our support goal for year 1 includes operating and startup costs and is outlined below. Would you consider partnering with us?

Start up costs = \$25,000

- Legal/entity set up
- Equipment
- Marketing/signage
- Core team moving expenses

Operating Costs = \$165,000

- Pastoral salary + insurance
- Ministry expenses
- Facility rent
- Administrative (software, subscriptions, books/resources, accounting, etc.)
- Supplies

Year 1 total = \$190,000
