

Reading the Bible is not the only way for Christians to learn God's word and be edified by the contents of Scripture. In fact, for most of human history, God's words were unable to be read personally and regularly by the average person. It was not until soon after the invention of the printing press in 1440 that the Bible became widely available for the common man. Before the printing press, which is arguably the most important invention in human history, books had to be copied by hand and/or memorized. Because of the preciousness of God's word, God's people have practiced both. But by the time Jesus lived and ministered on earth, it was clear that he expected those with access to the written word of God to be acquainted with its teaching by having read it for themselves (cf. Matt. 12:3, 5; 19:4; 21:16, 42; 22:31). Now, God's word is available to English speakers in nearly every format imaginable. This only heightens our culpability to know God's word well.

Undoubtedly, the emphasis for God's people according to Scripture is to hear and heed God's voice. This is why, among other things to do with his word, God instructs us to memorize his word (Ps. 119:16; Pro. 3:1), meditate on his word (Josh. 1:8; Ps. 119:15, 23, 48), sing his word (Ps. 119:54; Eph. 5:19), preach his word (2Tim. 4:2), listen to his word (Pro. 2:2; 8:6), speak his word to one another (Eph. 4:15; 1Thess. 4:18), and to pay close attention to what he has said (Heb. 2:1; 2Pet. 1:19).

The following several reasons explain the importance of regular Bible reading. For an excellent, extended treatment on the benefits of Bible reading, pick up *How Readest Thou?* by J. C. Ryle, our church's giveaway book and the first book in the recommended resources section (page 11).

- 1. **GOD SPOKE THE WORDS OF SCRIPTURE.** On its own, this is reason enough to read the Bible. The worth of the speaker is what makes God's words so precious, and God, being of infinite worth, is infinitely worthy of being heard (Job 23:12; Ps. 19:10).
- 2. **GOD WROTE THE WORDS OF SCRIPTURE.** This goes beyond God speaking merely. God's words that we have written down for us in Scripture were also God's doing (Ex. 31:18; Jer. 36:27-32; 2Pet. 1:19-21). Therefore, we should read them.
- 3. **KNOWLEDGE OF SCRIPTURE IS NECESSARY FOR SALVATION.** No one can be saved apart from having some Bible knowledge because it is the Bible alone that tells man how

to be saved. A man may not own a Bible, may not have a Bible in his own language, and may have never seen a Bible before. But he must have first heard something of the biblical gospel before he can believe it and be saved (Rom. 1:15-16; 10:11-15). Regularly reading God's word will make the Christian more acquainted with his own salvation and better able to communicate the gospel to others.

- 4. KNOWLEDGE OF SCRIPTURE IS NECESSARY FOR SANCTIFICATION. We are all in need of personal change. We must become more like Jesus, and to do this, God has made his word the means by which we are conformed into the image of Christ (i.e., sanctified, Jn. 17:17). Therefore, regular Bible reading brings God's people into contact with the truth, God's choice medium for producing personal change.
- 5. KNOWLEDGE OF SCRIPTURE SHAPES OUR SUFFERING. Job, the same man who, for all time, exemplifies godly endurance in suffering (Jas. 5:10-11) also said, "I have treasured the words of his mouth more than my portion of food" (Job 23:12). Therefore, we ought to conclude that endurance in suffering and esteem of God's word go hand in hand.
- 6. **KNOWLEDGE OF SCRIPTURE PROTECTS US FROM DANGER.** God's wisdom, given to us in God's word, protects us from the danger and trouble we incur when left to our own foolish thoughts (see Proverbs chapter 2). To be sure, more than mere head-knowledge about the contents of Scripture is necessary to experience the protection that God's word offers. We must not only hear God's words, but also heed them as well (Pro. 4:1-6). Nevertheless, the point is that, before the word can be applied, it must first be known. Bible reading makes us know what God has said so that we can live trouble-free lives as we heed God's wise counsel in the Scriptures (Ps. 119:24).
- 7. KNOWLEDGE OF SCRIPTURE AIDS OUR ENTRANCE INTO THE KINGDOM. Those who endure to the end so that they eventually inherit God's kingdom (Ps. 1:6; 2:6-8) are those who delight in God's word (Ps. 1:2) because their humble faith in what God has spoken compels them to avoid ungodliness (Ps. 1:1), to grow constantly (Ps. 1:3), to heed God's gracious warnings (Ps. 2:10), and to worship him with reverence (Ps. 2:11-12). Entrance at last into God's kingdom begins with humbly opening his word.²

² This connection between inheriting the kingdom and heeding God's voice can be seen in the way Jesus begins and ends the Sermon on the Mount (Matt. 5:2-12 and 7:24-29). This same connection is made by the writer of Hebrews throughout the entire epistle, but especially poignantly in 3:7-4:2.



- 1. **READ PRAYERFULLY** by asking God to grant you insight into what you read from his word and to cause you to submit to whatever he will teach you in your reading. Psalm 119:33-37 offers an excellent example of this.
- 2. **READ HUMBLY** by receiving every word of Scripture as the very voice of almighty God. Humble confidence in God's ability to speak requires us to believe, obey, love, and receive, as inherently good, every word he has spoken (Pro. 30:5-6).
- 3. **READ TRUSTINGLY** by believing the truth of everything God has spoken. Jesus prayed that the truth would change us (Jn. 17:17); therefore, believing what he has revealed is the key to living a faithful life. For wherever faith is found, faithfulness is sure to follow (see Hebrews chapter 11).
- 4. **READ SINCERELY** by pursuing holiness of life inwardly in the fear of God. The one who fears God will care most what God thinks about his heart, where only God sees (Pro. 4:23; 1Thess. 2:3-4; Heb. 3:12). This fear of God will make us put on sincerity, which God's word is useful to produce (1Tim. 1:5).
- 5. **READ PURPOSEFULLY** by planning beforehand for regular, consistent, thoughtful Bible reading. Avoid reading verses or portions of Scripture randomly and, instead, read entire books of the Bible at a time. (Col. 4:16)
- 6. **READ ENGAGINGLY** by reading from the same physical Bible as often as possible and making marks with a pen or pencil. While the ability to access God's word digitally is an incredible modern blessing from the Lord, for most people, it seems the mind and memory are better aided by seeing the written word open before us as we carefully notate it in helpful ways.
- 7. **READ PATIENTLY** by taking a longterm approach to your Bible reading. The goal of Bible reading isn't so much to master God's word as it is to *be* mastered by God's Word. This should encourage us to think about our Bible intake in terms of years and decades, rather than seeking life-changing discoveries every time we read.

"Do not think you are getting no good from the Bible, merely because you do not see that

good day by day. The greatest effects are by no means those which make the most noise, and are most easily observed. The greatest effects are often silent, quiet, and hard to detect at the time they are being produced. Think of the influence of the moon

upon the Earth, and of the air upon the human lungs. Remember how

silently the dew falls, and how imperceptibly the grass grows. There may be far more doing than you think in your soul by your Bible-reading."

NAVIGATORS BOOK-AT-A-TIME BIBLE READING PLAN

This reading plan is designed to help readers complete the entire Bible in a year. It guides the reader through an entire book of the Bible at a time, mixing Old and New Testament readings throughout the year and staying in only two different books at once. The Navigators website will require an email address before granting access to the free plan.

ROBERT MURRAY M'CHEYNE READING PLAN

This reading plan was practiced by Robert Murray M'Cheyne, a Scottish preacher in the 1800s, and popularized by modern theologian and author, D. A. Carson. It includes readings from four places daily, taking the reader through the Old Testament once and the New Testament and Psalms twice. Bookmarks with the readings from each section of Scripture can be downloaded here. Other printable formats can be found here.

FIVE DAY BIBLE READING PLAN

This plan takes the reader through the entire Bible (or just the New Testament) in one year, while only reading five times each week. The Old Testament readings are structured chronologically, as far as possible, instead of straight through from left to right or an entire book at a time. Job is placed at the end of this plan.


CHRONOLOGICAL BIBLE READING PLAN

This plan will take the reader through the entire Bible in a single year, ordering the reading for each day by the order in which it occurs in Scripture historically. Many have found that reading the Bible this way helps to grasp how the people, events, and books of the Bible all fit together. However, those who do utilize this plan should keep a couple factors in mind: (1) the books of Scripture were written as single units rather than to chronicle the order of events; therefore, the reader may find greater difficulty in grasping the author's intention in writing a certain book due to regularly moving between various parts of Scripture; (2) some portions of Scripture (many of the Psalms, for example) are difficult, or even impossible, to order chronologically; (3) at times the interpreter must make a decision about the particular timing of an event, whether it is past, present, or future, or whether (as in the gospels) similar events are the same or different; therefore, with these finals factors in mind, the order of the readings is not always beyond debate or discussion.



It answers the question, "What must a biblically sound church prioritize and practice to effectively reach underprivileged people?" JOHN MACARTHUR — THE GOSPEL ACCORDING TO JESUS Though he is the author of more than 150 books, this is John MacArthur's most famous and most controversial work. In it, MacArthur refutes the teaching that Jesus can be Savior without also being Lord and shows with piercing clarity that the good news preached by Jesus himself called for unqualified submission to his authority. 




DAN DEWITT AND CATALINA ECHEVERRI — THE FRIEND WHO
